The **James F. Henry Award**, named in honor of the CPR Institute's founder, was presented to Hon. Janet Reno for sustained, outstanding ADR contributions.

The award for **Outstanding Practical Achievement Award** was given to Bridgestone/Firestone's Early Resolution Program and Use of National Settlement Counsel. A **Special Award for Distinguished Contribution to the Field of Dispute Resolution** was presented to the American Bar Association Section on Dispute Resolution.

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The **Professional Articles Prize** was awarded to Chris Guthrie for his article, 'Panacea or Pandora's Box?: The Costs of Options in Negotiation,' 88 Iowa L. Rev. 601 (2003) with Honorable Mentions to Richard C. Reuben for 'First Options, Consent to Arbitration, and the Demise of Separability: Restoring Access to Justice for Contracts with Arbitration Provisions,' 56 SMU L. Rev. 819 (2003) and Jennifer K. Robbennolt for 'Apologies and Legal Settlement: An Empirical Examination,' Michigan L. Rev. (2003). The **Student Articles Prize** was awarded to I. Glenn Cohen 'Negotiating Death: ADR and End-of-Life Decisionmaking,' Harvard Law School Course paper with Honorable Mentions to Robert Alexander Schwartz for 'Can Arbitration Do More for Consumers? The TILA Class Action Reconsidered,' 78 N.Y.U.L. Rev. 809 (2003), Khalil Z. Shariff for 'Designing Institutions to Manage Conflict: Principles for the Problem Solving Organization,' 8 Harv. Negotiation L. Rev. 133 (2003) and Donna Shestowsky for her article, 'Improving Summary Jury Trials: Insights from Psychology,' 18 Ohio St. J. on Disp. Resol. 469 (2003).
